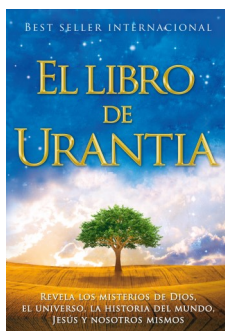

They met to finish up some remaining work and to celebrate the upcoming book.

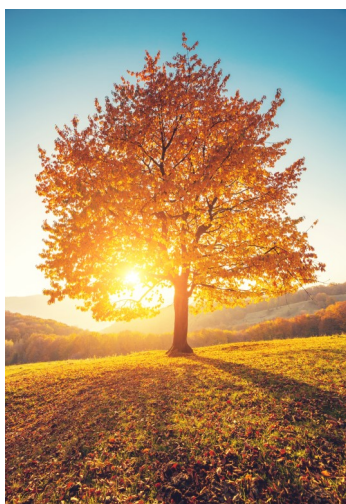
Over time, translations need improving, and the current Spanish books are no exception. This new revision is faithful to the English original, linguistically accurate, and stylistically beautiful. The team

preserved as much as possible of the 1993 Latin American translation, while using the European translation as a reference tool.

Sickness, job changes, and family obligations didn't deter this selfless volunteer team. They spent thousands of hours tediously making, word by word, needed improvements. We all feel

NOTEWORTHY BOARD DECISIONS FROM THE JULY 2019 TRUSTEES MEETING

1. Urantia Book Internet School

Having recently completed its 20th year, the Urantia Book Internet School (UBIS) has been the longest-lasting school for readers. Registration for the September trimester opened on September 9, and enrollment was robust. Volunteer-led classes in English (6), Spanish (4), French (3), and Portuguese (1) began on Monday, the 23rd. 2. Arabic Translation under Revision

The Foundation's Arabic translation of *The Urantia Book* was first completed in the late 1990s. The board voted to proceed with a light revision.

3. Partnership with the Pipeline of Light

The Urantia Book Fellowship and Urantia Foundation have agreed to a five-year Latin American book placement program. *El libro de Urantia* will be provided at no cost to the Pipeline of Light.

4. Property Tax Update for 533 Diversey

Since the last president's report, we made progress fixing the 300% tax increase



levied on 533 Diversey. We are optimistic that there will be a positive outcome.

5. Board Reports

The board reviewed a) a report from the president and the executive director, b) a financial and an investments report from the treasurer, and c) reports from the Book, Education, Fundraising, Outreach, and Translations Committees.

6. Community Relations

Urantia Foundation desires goodwill within the readership community. To that end, leaders from Urantia Association International (UAI), the Urantia Book Fellowship, and Urantia University attended Urantia Foundation's July board meeting via Zoom. Invited and presenting were Chris Wood, president of UAI; Lara Amyx, finance chair and Emilio Coppola, treasurer, of

the Fellowship; and Elisabeth Callahan, executive director of UrantiaUniversity.

Each group, including Urantia Foundation, presented their programs and hopes for the future. There was ample time for Q&A by the attendees. As stated in *The Urantia Book*, you can't help but love someone once you understand them. This first exchange was productive and opened the door for future conversations.

STUDY GROUPS AND TRANSLATIONS

When I found *The Urantia Book* in 1979, I was shown a French version of the fourth part of the book “La Vie et les Enseignements de Jésus.” At that time, I had no interest in reading the story of the life of Jesus as I had read his story in the Bible; it was the other parts of the book that were of interest to me.

Unbeknownst to me at the time, the French version of *The Urantia Book* was not available due to some problems with the printing. Fortunately, knowing English as a second language, I was able to read the original version.

It took me a year and a half to complete a first reading. In 1987 I attended my first study group, and the host of that group was reading from the English text. It was only in 1999, when I started my own study group, that I became acquainted with the French translation of *The Urantia Book*, as all the other readers in the group were reading it.

It was a bit disconcerting because some of the words in the French did not convey the correct meaning of the English. For example, *la pensée* was used for “the mind.” *Le mental* would have been a better choice. Interestingly, this word—along with many other words and phrases—did not bother the other readers in the

group because they had not read the English.

Fortunately, the French translation has been revised twice since its publication in 1962. Work on the first revision began in 1978 and was completed in 1994. The second revision began in 2012 and was published in 2014.

When the latest revision was published, the members of my study group and I would compare it to the previous French version and to the original English text. I remember one reader who was profoundly attached to his first book, and he waited a few years before switching to the new revision. As the study group host, I never put pressure on him to acquire the newest revision, but through study and comparisons with the original text, he finally made the transition. When asked why, he said the new version made more sense in better understanding the meaning of spiritual, philosophical, and religious concepts.

I realized that the sentimental attachment we have to our first *Urantia Book* might become a hindrance to the desire to expand our cosmic consciousness and enhance our spiritual perception. That goal might be eclipsed by a lack of understanding if the words—such as Thought Adjuster, fusion, and many others—do not carry the exact meaning of the original words. There is always room for improvement regarding our human efforts to translate a book of such immensity and profound teachings and concepts. This handicap in translation, while inevitable, is a key reason for the ongoing revision process.

After getting acquainted with

how translations and revisions are done at Urantia Foundation, I have gained the utmost respect for those loving and tireless workers who devote so much of their time to make *The Urantia Book* available to people of different languages and cultures.

I am astounded by the number of readers and the amount of time in years that was devoted to the latest revision of the Spanish text. In my opinion, the quality process and efforts involved in this revision surpass by far any revision process done to date by Urantia Foundation. No one individual can achieve this quality of work; teamwork is essential in the process of translation and revision.

numerous appellations. Because of this conceptual poverty associated with so much ideational confusion, I have been directed to formulate this introductory statement in explanation of the meanings which should be attached to certain word symbols as they may be hereinafter used in those papers which the Orvonton corps of truth revealers have been authorized to translate into the English language of Urantia. 0:0.1 (1.1)

First, can we just take a moment to appreciate the work of those celestial translators? Now imagine the work involved in translating

the English text into another language, the difficulty of finding the right words, of expressing the right meaning for a difficult spiritual concept, the long hours spent revising, consulting with others, and praying for enlightenment when in doubt.

Let us be thankful to, and appreciative of, those loving souls who have dedicated so much of their time to make the revelation accessible to us in the language that we speak. Let our reading be guided by the Spirit of Truth and the love of the Father.

THE SECOND UAI EUROPEAN CONFERENCE IN TALLINN

Editor's Note: The second European Urantia Conference (not counting the global international conference held in Amsterdam in 2018) took place July 11–14, at the Tallink City Hotel in Tallinn, Estonia. It was co-sponsored by Urantia Association International (UAI), Urantia Foundation, and Truthbook, and was hosted by the Estonian Urantia Association. In this article, three readers closely associated with the conference share their thoughts on what made the conference a success.



Perspectives on the Tallinn Conference from Sebastian Nozzi

This past July the second European conference organized by UAI took place in Tallinn, Estonia. It welcomed 87 readers coming from 15 different countries. The talks and group activities were translated into five different languages—Estonian, Finnish, French, Lithuanian, and Spanish.

The conference was a huge success and received positive feedback from participants and speakers alike. It marks an important milestone in the history of European events.

Sparks Ignited: The first European conference sponsored by UAI was in 2016 in Hungary, Budapest. It was successful and attracted visitors from other parts of the world, in particular North America. Indeed, it felt like an international conference. It served to infuse us Europeans with energy and embolden us to start holding regular European conferences in the future.

At the end of 2017 many European leaders got together to make plans for the next European conference. Many cities were proposed, but most of them lacked a local organization with the potential to carry the idea to fruition. I was present when Karmo Kalda, representing the Estonian Association, boldly stepped forward and stated, “We can host the next European conference.” This made such an impression on

me that I cast my vote for the project.

Made in Europe: The Tallinn conference was the collaboration between people from different associations. Jaap Terra, the main organizer of the 2018 Amsterdam conference, offered his help and expertise to Karmo. The Dutch acted as coaches and helped set up the groundwork to get things started.

Equally positive was the natural collaboration between the Estonian and the Finnish associations. Risto Mäntynen, the president of the Finnish Association, participated in key aspects such as website and logo design, program, choice of speakers, and more. The Finns also took responsibility in organizing the post-conference.

Our Urantia Young Adults International committee chair, Anna Zeven, who is Dutch, organized the pre-conference. I did not attend it, but when I met the group who did, many reported about life-changing events and moments.

And finally, the UAI's conference chair, Antonio Schefer, made sure that the process went smoothly, guiding the organization and taking care of many other aspects surrounding the conference.

For the most part, this event was “made in Europe.” But in all fairness it should be said that it would not have been possible, and only half as fun, without the support of our co-sponsoring international organizations (such as UAI and Urantia Foundation) and without the help, support, participation, and presence of our international brothers as sisters.

The Tallinn Effect: The conference's theme was “Sowing Seeds.” The theme is generic enough that many different perspectives can be presented upon it (as was indeed the case when looking at the program). Also, it is something that the movement in Europe desperately needs in order to grow. It is certainly thought-provoking: how to sow seeds in Europe?

The conference in Tallinn was a good example of “sowing seeds.” It goes to show that a small but dedicated team can sow seeds and turn an idea into a real event. With time, patience, dedication, planning, and execution, things that start as an idea (the seed) can grow into a vision which finally materializes into reality.

But impressive as the work done by the Estonian team was, it was *not* what I call the “Tallinn effect.” Many wonderful things transpired during this conference and afterwards. The stories are many, and each of them as unique as the people involved in them. Old friends were reunited, new friendships were formed, people were inspired, and new energy and enthusiasm were given to us to start new projects or resurrect abandoned ones. To keep the fire in our hearts alive and do something positive with it—this is what I call the “Tallinn effect.”

Conclusion: The Tallinn conference marked another important milestone in the history of the Urantia movement in Europe. This level of success and cooperation shows that, despite our challenges, we are moving in the right direction towards a more dynamic, integrated, and synergetic Urantia movement in Europe.

Thoughts on Principles of Conference Planning from Karmo Kalda

People who have organized events such as our conference usually say that they require a lot of work and problem solving. Yes, there were problems and difficulties, but not at the concept stage. After the 2017 meeting in Sitges, Catalonia, Antonio Schefer asked me to prepare an overview of our vision for the conference, and I had in my mind a full picture of what it should be. When I introduced it to other Estonian readers, they didn't have anything to add. I do not think that I came up with the concept on my own. Someone—perhaps the angels—must have put it into my head.

Attitude: I believe that everything starts with your attitude. A duty that you have undertaken should be seen not so much as a duty but as an opportunity to do something better in this world, and that is the attitude you should bring to the project. When we had our first conference meeting with the Estonian organizing team, I emphasized that the people who will come to Tallinn are not just attendees of the conference, but our brothers and sisters who must feel that they are in good

hands. We should see ourselves as a mother hen gathering her chicks under her wing.

Cultural Aspects: Whenever I speak with someone who has attended a conference, they usually don't remember the topics of the presentations, but they do remember the people, the emotions, and the joy. Also, we don't always have time to arrive early or stay late and become acquainted with the city or country we are visiting. So, we offered opportunities during the conference for sightseeing and spending time getting to know one another.

Finances: Simply put, the budget must always be either in balance or with a surplus.

Gratitude: Thank you, Antonio, for trusting us! Thank you to all of the presenters! Thank you, attendees! And thank you to all who supported us in so many ways!



Reflections on Sowing Seeds from Peep Söber

In the early 1970s, some unknown Finnish readers gifted a book to the leader of a spiritualist group of which I was a member. Bringing that kind of book—a religious one—across the Soviet border into Tallinn could have been criminal. But the Finns were lucky because the border guards didn't notice the book. These readers didn't know our leader but had somehow obtained his home address,

and they planted a seed in the right soil.

People here at that time were spiritually more hungry than they are now, living in a free country. Nevertheless, after we had translated the whole book in order to read it, I was the only one who appreciated its great value. But sometimes even one man in the right time and place is enough to begin the process of growth into the next stage. During the preparations for this conference I was amazed at how a little seed planted about 50 years ago could mobilize people today to come here from so many countries to attend a conference.

There are few readers here, and our local association is small compared to others. So we wanted our concept for this conference to be practical: qualitative inner growth and quantitative outer growth. We wanted to hear how our brothers and sisters have achieved what they have and to share with everyone what we have done.

Can we grow from the present stage in both ways? Yes. But one thing is obvious: new quality can arise from our inner world, and to accelerate this process we need relationships—with God through the inner spirit (the vertical direction) and with other readers (the horizontal direction). Therefore, conferences are a basic need.

Once in Chicago at an international conference I remarked to my roommate from Germany how odd it was that European readers could meet together only in America. Now this has changed, and we are hopeful that the practice of holding European conferences will continue.

For many European readers it was their first time at a conference, and I can only imagine how inspiring they found it.

REMEMBERING MARK BLOOMFIELD

Mark Bloomfield was a former field representative of Urantia Foundation. He volunteered from the late 1990s to the early 2000s. He was highly successful in placing Urantia Books in public libraries, seminaries, colleges, universities, and other places of learning all over the world. He personally hand-seeded around 9,000 Urantia Books!

He was particularly inspired to seed the revelation in developing countries where he had lived and worked for many years as a humanitarian missionary. He worked with Mother Teresa in India for some years before devoting himself to seeding Urantia Books. Having experienced firsthand the heart-wrenching and atrocious plight of women and children, he decided to devote his life to treating the cause of the world's problems rather than the symptoms. He was truly driven to get the Urantia Revelation seeded into the hands of educated people who lived among the innocent millions who were caught up in the cycle of ignorance and poverty.

During much of that time I served as Urantia Foundation's Representative Manager, where I had the pleasure of assisting with the coordination of Mark's many seeding projects out in the field. I attended three bookfairs in

India when Mark was living there. He took care of all the arrangements for the booth including the importing and delivery of the books. He also acted as a chaperone and educator of Indian culture for us western visitors who were not familiar with the complexities of life in India. Mark's ability to engage with interested people who visited our booth was impressive to say the least. He was eloquent, gracious, and able to adapt the Urantia Book teachings to literally hundreds of people hailing from the many different faiths practiced in India.

Mark was truly selfless and amazingly courageous in the manner in which he undertook this amazing work of seeding thousands of books. He could live on a shoestring and stay in incredibly substandard accommodations that many of us in the west would never dream of staying in. He left a significant trail of revelation behind in India, Latin America, Africa, Europe, Asia, and the United States. The stories he wrote in his regular reports of his journey, as he traveled from city to city and country to country placing books, make for fascinating reading. Mark has been called the "Johnny Appleseed" and the "Indiana Jones" of the Urantia movement, but he liked to call himself the "chore boy," saying his favorite historical role-model was the young lad John Mark who spent a whole day in the hills alone with Jesus. At the end of one of his field reports, Mark wrote:

And all this goes a long way to explain why this particular fieldworker has been doing what he's been doing these years, for the chore boy of Jesus'

day [John Mark] has long been the nearest he has ever had to a role model.

Mark died recently after a tragic incident in Swansea, Wales. He was just 54 years old. Our heartfelt sympathy and prayers go to Mark's family and to all those who knew him. May his resurrection on the Mansion Worlds be joyous and compensate for the tragic manner of his premature departure from this world. Farewell Mark, until we meet again.
